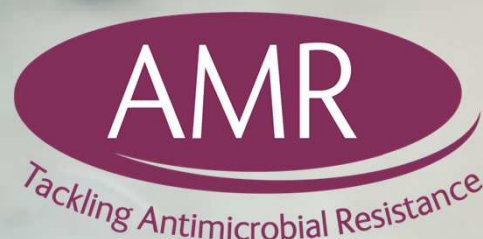

This symposium brings together researchers who are attending to 'the social' in responding to the complex issue of antimicrobial resistance (AMR), including anthropologists, sociologists, historians, geographers, philosophers, and other related researchers, who are contributing in a range of ways to understanding and responding to AMR, and in so-doing are opening up spaces for interpreting the ways AMR knowledge and action are co-constructed.
